Band Concert Canceled at Valley Forge

Freedoms Foundation has announced that a Labor Day concert by the U. S. Army Band at the foundation headquarters near Valley Forge Park has been canceled.

Lou Greco, Freedoms Foundation vice president for information, said the cancelation had nothing to do with the Monday rally in the Park scheduled by the Vietnam Veterans Against the War.

The rally will climax a threeday march from the Morristown National Historic Park, Morristown N. J.

Greco said the band concert will be rescheduled later this year as part of the dedication ceremony for a new Freedoms Foundation building.

A spokesman for the Army Band in Washington said the concert was, canceled because President Nixon has requested a performance of "Torchlight Tattoo" on the White House grounds on Monday. The band is required for

His father said Piersol was believed to have been killed in a helicopter crash Aug. 26 which took 32 lives.

Wait, Ky Told

Washington—(UPI)—A visit by South Vietnamese Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky to the United States, including a speech to an Oct. 3 "Win the War!" rally in Washington, would be ill-advised, the South Vietnamese embassy is beneved to have told sargon.

Ambassador Bur Diem, evidently surprised when Ky announced plans for the trip Thursday, discussed the matter yesterday at the State Department and indicated afterward he was advising his government not to allow Ky's trip.

U. S. officials were said to have warned that an appearance by Ky, a militant anti-Communist, might spark counter demonstrations. The rally sponsor is the Rev. Carl McIntire of Collingswood, N. J.

About 70 veterans wearing military fatigues started the march at 8.30 A.M. at the Jockey Hollow section of Morristown National Park, north of the Somerset County towns.

The 86-mile march of protest is scheduled to last three days.

A four-hour rally is set for Valley Forge on Labor Day, with scheduled speakers to include Jane Fonda, New York congressional candidate Bella

Al Hubbard of Jamaica, N.Y., executive secretary of the Vietnam Veterans Against the War, said even though the will still "focus attention on our demands . . . those things that must be done." Police Observe

The veterans marched single file along each side of the highway.

State police watched the march from a helicoprer above while other troopers, local policemen and FBI investigators observed from the ground.

The marchers, who slowed traffic on the highway, carried weapons to stage mock raids and house-ransacking demonstrations along the route.
