Missile Buildup Reported Behind Egypt's Truce Zone

New York - (UPI) - Secret behind the cease-fire zone," U.S. recombaisance pictures show that the Russians and Egyptians have taken advantage of the Middle East ceasefire to provide Egypt with the most massive anti-aircraft system ever created," Time magazine reported yesterday.

Most of the 81 marchers were white men, with a few black men and several women. Most of them were in their twenties, many wearing army combat fatigues and army boots. Several wore red arm bands, which a marcher said, indicated they were actually wounded in combat.

After crossing the bridge, the marchers had a prearranged meeting in Center Bridge on a grassy traffic island with members of a group called_Making A Nation (MAN).
